THE ART OF THE HOME

When *Southern Accents* magazine approached Harrison Design Associates in Atlanta to build this home in the Buckhead community as its 2000 Atlanta Showhouse, the design team knew it was a dream come true.

"We were given free reign to allow aesthetics – not cost – to drive the building of this home," says project architect Gregory Palmer, AIA. "We focused on using true, honest materials like brick. It truly was built for the art of the house, which made it a real dream project for us."

EXPANSIVE YET INTIMATE

The owners of this home wanted the best in modern design techniques while maintaining an estate feel on its six-acre lot in Waxhaw, NC. By staying true to classical design techniques and subtle masonry details, the home has an expansive, timeless quality that doesn't overpower visitors.

“Architectural integrity was very important to us,” says Don Ryan of Simonini Builders in Charlotte. “This home has all the modern conveniences, but we didn't compromise the timeless design to get there.”

To break down the mass of this home, contemporary and classical design elements were used side by side. The coarse face of oversized tumble brick lends an aged look, while rustic masonry joints are achieved by wiping excess mortar with a gloved hand rather than using a traditional grapevine joint. Topped by tall chimneys with ornate masonry arches, this home's judicious use of detail makes it a timeless beauty.

Over 10,000 square feet of brick and cobblestone pavers in a fishscale pattern greets visitors (3a).

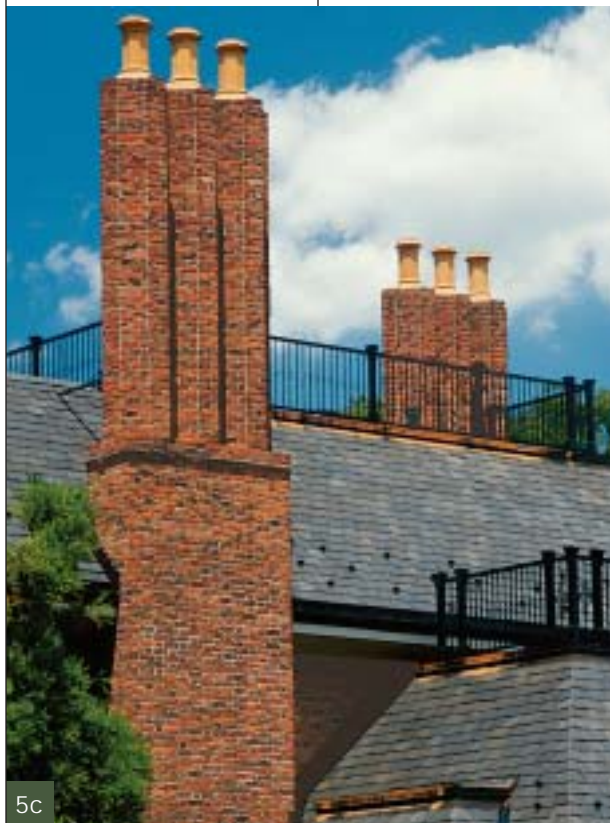
A UNIFIED VISION

When it comes to designing dream homes like this one in North Carolina, architect John Linn of Greensboro insists that a shared vision between architect and homeowner lie at the heart of the project from start to finish.

“There must be a unity of thought,” he says. “There must be one vision, one story. And only the architect can make sure everyone on the team is working toward that vision.” Color and contrast are the defining elements of this home. The brick supplier modified its



manufacturing process to achieve the special toned-down reddish-orange shade the homeowner wanted. The custom brick, now called Tryon Oversized, has since become a favorite among its customers.



Numerous brick details and limestone accents, achieved with special shapes, scales the home to fit the surrounding neighborhood (5a-d).
